




PLAYING AN E MINOR SCALE






DAD TUNING -E MINOR



In this book we will put a capo on the first fret to make E minor. So the open strings are greyed out as our notes will start from the first fret.

ABOUT TAB AND THE CAPO

When using the capo, the tab will be notated differently to guitar tab. This is because the frets on a dulcimer are not chromatic i.e. some are steps and some are half steps, So, the frets will be notated by their actual fret number, not the fret number after the capo.

- If the capo is on the first fret like the diagram below, the position where the dot is would be fret 3 so would say '3 on the tab'. Even though it i the 2nd fret after the capo position.
- Unless, they are open strings i.e. no fingers on frets the tab will say O (even though it is first fret).

* Capo on 1st Fret *

(For dulcimer with extra fret after fret 6 such as McSpadden)



Note- read the frets as normal so fret 2 is still fret 2 even with the capo on
